Theme for this week (20 Feb - 26 Feb 2023): Love for ourselves Life Skills theme for the week: We can manage our feelings

This week, after Shrove Tuesday's pancakes, Ash Wednesday marks the first day of Lent. Ashes made from palm crosses are blessed and are used to make crosses on people's foreheads. The custom dates back to the middle ages. Ash Wednesday church services set the tone for Lent, with sombre readings and hymns, minimal decoration and a focus on penitence and prayer.

Lent is a time to 'Look IN'

Many Christians use the time of Lent - from Ash Wednesday until Thursday 6 April, three days before

Easter Sunday - to reflect on their faith and the Easter story. Some people choose to give up things during Lent, like certain foods or habits. They may use this action to remember the time Jesus fasted for forty days in the desert as a test of self-discipline.

Lent is a time to 'Look OUT'

Many Christians also use Lent as a way of giving to others, making a fresh start, or taking on a new challenge.



Also, it is a time to focus on looking outwards to others in need in the community and wider world. Jesus' death was the ultimate sacrifice that inspires us to be generous, to be compassionate, to give to others and to show love in our own lives.

During these six weeks before Easter, we will consider the ways in which we can Look IN and Look

OUT this Lent. Using resources from the Archbishops' Young Leaders Award, each week we will focus on a different community that our students are part of: Family; Friends; School; Local Community; Country and World.

The resources encourage us to reflect on words from the Bible, and then to look outwards, to speak, give, act and pray.

In this poem, 'The Other', <u>RS Thomas</u> calls to mind the power of prayer, a key part of the Lenten season.
