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Value for this half term: Respect

Theme for this week (24 - 30 April 2023): Earning respect Life Skills theme for the week: We are able to ask questions

Last week, in Friday's 'Business Hub' session, Year 7 students had the opportunity to listen to people from a variety of walks of life and to ask them questions about their career pathways. Also, Year 6 students came to the secondary site on Thursday afternoon and enjoyed working collaboratively with each other and Year 9 student ambassadors in order to complete the orienteering challenge. Thank you to all staff, students and visitors from the wider community for making these such fantastic experiences.

Sunday 23 April marked Saint George's Day and the day of Shakespeare's death, in 1616. It is often said that Shakespeare died on his birthday, although it's really a little more complicated than that: we don't know his actual birthday, but we do know that he was baptised on 26 April, 1564, and so, by tradition, his birthday is celebrated three days earlier, on 23 April.

Shakespeare is widely regarded as being the greatest writer in the English language and the world's pre-eminent dramatist. In his play, 'Henry V', King Henry (Harry) famously gives a rousing <u>speech</u> to his soldiers before they go into battle, ending with the words: *I see you stand like greyhounds in the slips*, */ Straining upon the start. The game's afoot: / Follow your spirit, and upon this charge / Cry "God for Harry, England, and Saint George!"*

Uplifting in a very different way, modern poet, Brian Patten, wrote an alternative version of St George's story. Patten said: "There's no country more beautiful than England in April; "I believe we should celebrate its landscape, and its flora and fauna through St George's Day."

Entitled 'The True Dragon', Brian Patten's St George finds the dragon too beautiful to kill:

St George was in awe of it It was a thing apart He hid the sleeping dragon Inside every English heart.

So on this day let's celebrate England's valleys full of light, The green fire of the landscape Lakes shivering with delight.

Let's celebrate St George's Day, The dragon in repose;



The brilliant lark ascending, The yew, the oak, the rose.
